In Re: Health Canada's update to the CAN/CSA-Z900.2.2.:22 "Tissues for transplantation" standard to eliminate the requirement for tissue donors to be screened for a history of active or past Ebola virus infection.

To Whom it May Concern:

The American Association of Tissue Banks (AATB) writes in appreciation of the October 29, 2024, Health Canada update to the CAN/CSA-Z900.2.2.:22 "Tissues for transplantation" standard to eliminate the requirement for tissue donors to be screened for a history of active or past Ebola virus infection. As noted in the announcement, this will ensure the Health Canada standard is aligned with AATB's 15th edition of Standards, set to take effect on January 31, 2025.

Importantly, the AATB believes that this decision will not compromise the safety of these tissue products but will reduce the administrative burden on tissue banking staff. At this time, due to reduced Ebola transmission and other factors, we believe the risk of Ebola transmission through donor tissue is extremely low. AATB will continue to monitor regulatory actions related to communicable diseases that may affect the safety and availability of tissue products.
